



### Baldi Memorial Lecture – Nomination Details

The Baldi Memorial Lectures of the International Society of Limnology were established in 1952 to perpetuate the memory of Edgardo Baldi by stimulating research and inquiry within the field of theoretical limnology to which he devoted his life work. SIL honors **one of its members** by requesting a synthesis of a subject within theoretical limnology to be delivered as a plenary lecture during the next SIL congress.

Outstanding scientific contributions to theoretical limnology will be considered in the broadest sense. **The nominee shall be member of SIL at the time of nomination.** Where similarly qualified candidates are nominated, an advantage will be given to women and scientists from developing countries (who in the past received only a negligible fraction of the awards). For nominations, please provide the following information:

- Name and current affiliation
- Research area (3-4 keywords)
- A short statement (max 10 lines) why the nominee is a suitable candidate for the Baldi award
- A list of five (no more, please) main publications that support that the candidate has internationally visible research achievements and is suitable for the SIL Baldi award
- A selective list of main functions, services and awards (e.g., editorial boards, functions in organizations, awards by research organizations)
- Information on SIL membership: since when (we can check this in the database if needed), any function with SIL (executive board, national representative, committees, etc), any award received by SIL

SIL has formed an international committee, which will select the recipients among your nominations. The committee members are: Prof. Cristiana Callieri (Italy), Prof. Shin-ichi Nakano (Japan), Prof. Singaraju S. S. Sarma (Mexico), Dr. Björn Wissel (General Secretary of SIL), Dr. Thomas Mehner (President of SIL)
